PUBLIC COMMENT ON NON-AGENDA ITEMS:

Linda Bell, 182 Garden Road, Bell states she received a letter from an engineering firm regarding a recreational pond being put by the Libby Middle School. Bell expressed concern over the pond being only a block away from the school and the safety of small children.

OLD BUSINESS:

American Legion Auxiliary #95, Statue in cemetery repair. Tabled and moved to unfinished business. There is some confusion of exactly which property it is on.

NEW BUSINESS:

Tony Petrusha, 559 Florence Road, Petrusha is here to discuss a request for the purchase/donation of the Lower Reservoir Sampling Building for Turner Mountain. Petrusha wanted to make certain that no one thought anything "sneaky" was done to get the building.

Mayor Williams pointed out that this topic was not shared with Council and tonight is for discussion only.

Discussion followed.

Request for Easement by Sewage Treatment Plant.

Chris Noble, 140 Antler Ridge Road - Mr. Noble gave an overview of reasons for the purposed easement from City Service Road onto the BNSF right-of-way. Noble stated BNSF would like to get rid of the "Pamida" crossing as it is a hazardous crossing. BNSF has not yet been approached Noble to assist in paying for any of the improvements. Noble continued saying that this could be good for the community growth, it would give a corridor for city services up to the end of the four lane on Highway 2 at no cost to the city for future growth. Noble is only asking for a letter granting they have an easement so they can approach the railroad.

Discussion followed.

Adopt Resolution 1993 – Authorization to Submit to Montana Coal Endowment Program (MCEP) Infrastructure Planning Grant.

Mike Fraser, Engineer for the City of Libby explained the reasons for these grants and also provided printed material for the Council members. In March 2021 Fraser met with City Council to talk about ongoing activities and public works planning. Last year two applications were submitted to Renewable Resources for loan grants as well as to MCEP for a grant, both of which were funded to replace instrumentation and controls at the treatment plant. Those applications were based on a report done in 2018. Also, in 2018 City Council amended the Water PER that had been completed in 2013. Fraser thinks that enough changes and improvements have been made to the system that an evaluation of the entire system is in order.

Submitting an application for a planning grant to Renewable Resources would be the second component of the plan to submit to MCEP. Then the City could advertise and select an engineer to look in depth at the water system.

Fraser is requesting that the resolution approving the application to MCEP and for the mayor to sign the same.

If Payne was only giving an update and not discussing litigation that would be a different situation.

Payne purposed to begin in open session and layout options the City has going forward and if the discussion goes toward litigation strategy he can try to avoid that. Ultimately Payne would like to have a sub-committee set up to come up with ideas moving forward with IP.

Discussion followed. Smith and Taylor volunteered to be the sub-committee.

Taylor asks when the sub-committee could meet.

Payne is willing to meet after the Council meeting tonight. Taylor and Smith agreed to this.

Committee Reports:

Fire – Councilor Zimmerman reported that for the second time, Lincoln County Rural/Libby City Fire did not receive the \$120,000 grant for SCBA equipment. The SCBA equipment the City/County Rural Fire has is very aged and at the end of its life span, if not passed it. There are other funding programs out there to look at but, if none can be found, Fire Department will be looking for \$100,000 or more from the City to help with purchasing new SCBA breathing apparatus for firefighters entering into burning buildings.

Police – Chief Kessel reported there were 216 service calls, 17 arrests, 25 citations and 3 City Ordinance violations for September 2021. Sargent Pape is at a forensic interview training school in Helena, this course will allow him to interview child victims of sexual offenses. The jail is still taking only violent offenders for the most part. The new radios are up and running with no problems. Lastly, there was a deer put down by the elementary school a couple of weeks ago that tested positive for CWD.

Zoning Commission - Nothing to report. Planning board will meet October 25, 2021, at 7:00pm at City Hall.

Public Comment on Non-Agenda Items:

D.C. Orr, 1117 Nevada-Ave., voiced his opinions towards previous City Councils and a perceived injustice to one of the members and expressed concerns regarding closed meetings referring to MCA 2-3-203 (The Montana Sunshine Law).

Tony Petrusha, 559 Florence Road, gave an update on the road improvements on Flower Creek Road (FS128). The first phase is done which included widening and smoothing the road, adding culverts, and relocating the gate. Phase 2 is paving which originally quoted at \$118,000 but is now down to \$80,000. Flower Creek Project has \$50,000 and are looking into a grant for \$15,000. Tony asked the city to consider giving a \$20,000 investment for their part of the City's easement to the dam for future recreation.

Old Business:

American Legion Auxiliary #97, Statue in Cemetery repair.

Mayor Williams reported that the American Legion Auxiliary #97 have raised enough funds for the repair and replacement of the statue. The statue will be removed around Veterans Day and the wreath laying ceremony will be November 11, 2021, at 11:00am.

No further discussion is needed on this topic at this time.

City Council Reassignments.

Councilor Zimmerman stated that the reassignments have been completed, Councilor McNew will chair the budget/finance committee as well as sitting on the cemetery/parks and ordinance committees.

New Business:

Approve Resolution 1994 – Declaring certain property as surplus and authorizing its disposal.

Mayor Williams read aloud Resolution 1994 and added that this is the second time Mr. Petrusha has come to Council with this request and he deserves the courtesy of an answer, addressing Resolution 1994 will provide an answer.

Councilor Smith MADE A MOTION to adopt resolution 1994. Councilor Zimmerman SECONDED.

Councilor Taylor stated that he was under the understanding this would be put up for public auction and does not agree with it being a donation. This is City property; therefore, it belongs to the taxpayers and the City should benefit from the sale or disposal of this item.

Councilor Dufficy stated that he agrees with Councilor Taylor and that this building has value and should be auctioned off and taxpayers given back some of their money. Councilor Dufficy brought up that the city does not give away cop cars, they are auctioned off.

Councilor McNew asked if the building was donated would Turner Mountain pay the removal costs.

Tony Petrusha said Turner Mountain would pay the \$1,000 to \$1,500 cost to remove the property.

Councilor McNew said Turner Mountain does a great job for Libby, they bring in revenue to local businesses and he appreciates the work they do and would be in support of something like this.

Councilor Dufficy added that he appreciates what Turner Mountain does but if they really need the building then the city should open it up for bid and allow them to bid on it.

D.C. Orr – Asked how many generators the city has and proposed keeping this as a spare if needed rather than spending money for a new one in the future.

With no further discussion Mayor Williams asked for a vote verbal and show of hands.

Councilors Beach, Smith, Zimmerman and McNew voted FOR.

Councilors Taylor and Dufficy OPPOSED.

MOTION PASSED by a 4-2 vote. Turner Mountain will receive the generator and building.

Mayor Williams introduced Mike Fraser, who gave an overview of the authorizing submission of Community Development Block Grant for \$600,000 to supplement two other grants already received to replace the waste water plant controller and replace 3 critical sections of the sewer main within the city. This resolution certifies that Libby is a legal jurisdiction and can finance wastewater collection improvements that the City of Libby complies with all applicable parts of Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, all Federal Regulations state Laws and Regulations, and Community Development Facilities. The City of Libby is committing Funds granted in the amount of \$465,000 as matching funds. The Resolution authorizes Mayor Peggy Williams to summit the application on behalf of the City of Libby and provide additional information as needed. There will be a letter committing these funds that the mayor will sign along with any additional information and certifications that are compliant to the Civil Rights Act among others.

Council Discussion followed.

ORDINANCE 1995
